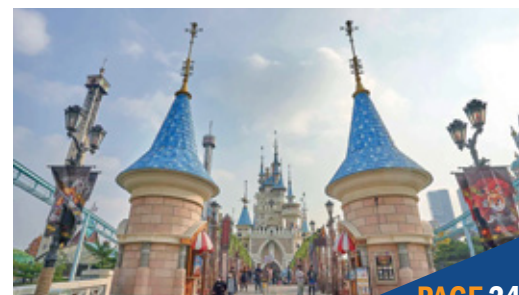

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51st CES and MXS open new deployable corrosion control facility

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- Airmen assigned to the 51st Civil Engineer Squadron and 51st Maintenance Squadron marked a major step forward in combat readiness during a ribbon cutting ceremony for a new deployable corrosion prevention and control facility, May 18, 2026.

The new capability restores full on-site aircraft corrosion control operations for the 51st MXS, allowing maintainers to complete critical F-16 Fighting Falcon paint and restoration work at Osan Air Base versus sending aircraft to off station facilities.

"This facility will be a massive return on readiness. We are slashing aircraft restoration time from 21 days at off station facilities to just five days right here," said Col. Todd Dawson, Air Force Life Cycle Management Center Rapid Sustainment Office deputy division chief assigned to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio. "This capability will generate over \$90 million in savings that would have otherwise been spent on outsourced contracts."

"This facility will be a massive return on readiness. We are slashing aircraft restoration time from 21 days at off station facilities to just five days right here, This capability will generate over \$90 million in savings that would have otherwise been spent on outsourced contracts." — Col. The reduced turnaround time increases aircraft availability, lowers logistical requirements and allows maintainers to return aircraft to the flight faster.

"This takes us from 50% capability to full operational capability, as this facility now meets all the requirements needed to perform corrosion control and aircraft painting," said Capt. Joshua Werfel, 51st CES requirements and optimization officer in charge. "If our jets aren't painted and they're not fully mission capable, then we're not ready to fight tonight."

In addition to supporting daily maintenance operations, the deployable system provides Airmen with expeditionary experience operating mobile infrastructure, strengthening future contingency capabilities across the Indo-Pacific and preparing maintainers to operate in austere environments in support of the 51st Fighter Wing's "Fight Tonight" mission.

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Personal Transportation Device Safety

In recent years, Personal Transportation Devices (PTDs) including electric scooters, e-bikes, hoverboards, and other battery powered micro mobility tools have become increasingly popular. While these devices offer convenience and eco-friendly transportation, they also pose emerging challenges in terms of fire safety.

1. Battery Fire Hazards

Most PTDs are powered by lithium-ion batteries, known for their high energy density. However, when damaged, improperly charged, or exposed to heat, these batteries can undergo thermal runaway, resulting in intense fires or explosions.

2. Residential Fire Risks

With more users charging devices indoors, particularly in multi-family residential buildings, the risk of rapid fire spread increases. Fires that start during nighttime charging can go undetected, making early evacuation and containment difficult.

3. Key Risk Factors

- Charging near combustible materials.
- Use of unofficial or damaged chargers.
- Overcharging or unsupervised charging.

4. Fire Safety Recommendations

To mitigate fire risks, the following safety practices are recommended:

- Always follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Do not charge overnight or while unattended.
- Do not store batteries in direct sunlight or inside hot vehicles and keep them away from children and liquids.
- Store e-bikes, e-scooters, and batteries away from exit doors and anything that can get hot or catch fire.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Contact HazWaste Office, Building 833 at 784-6508/6714.

It is critical to balance their benefits with proactive fire safety measures. Awareness, regulation, and preparedness will be key to preventing injuries and protecting communities from PTD-related fire incidents.

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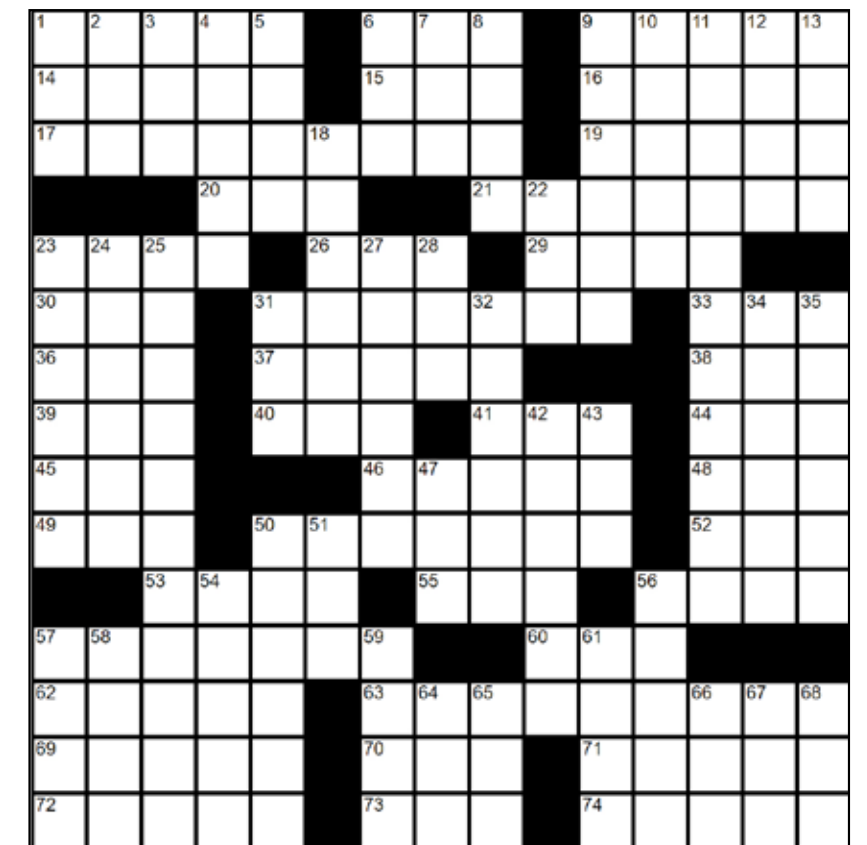

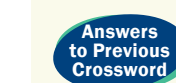

The Warfighter's Spirit

Not Every Game Has a Winner

My family loves games. Card games, board games, video games, and sports. Every one of these games' shares something in common: they end. They also have a start and they have an agreed-upon way to determine the outcome. Without these limitations, every family game night and every Olympic competition would

dissolve into chaos, with everyone claiming victory.

These are what the philosopher James Carse called Finite Games. They only work because they are limited in scope, duration, and possible outcomes. In other words, finite games are played within boundaries.

There is another type of game afoot that Carse called Infinite Games. They do not come with a fixed rulebook. They have no finish line, and players come and go. In fact, at times we may not even know who the other players are. The goal or purpose of these games is not to win, but to keep the game going. The only way to "lose" an infinite game is to quit or runout of the resources needed to stay in the game. Examples of infinite games include the childhood game of tag and goes on to include personal development, nation building, and scientific discovery. Instead of simply playing within boundaries, participants of infinite games

adapt and reshape those boundaries.

One of the greatest differences I see among people is whether we are living life to "win" or living life for something greater.

When we approach life with a finite mindset, we tend to focus narrowly on outcomes: promotion, recognition, comparison, or external validation. While these things have their place, they can hamper how we engage in what matters most: relationships, health, learning, and growth.

Playing the long game shifts our focus on how and why we play. Instead of trying to win, we seek to grow, we desire to contribute, and we stay engaged over time. Instead of resenting our worthy rivals, we cultivate an appreciation as we learn from them. We pursue goals that are bigger than ourselves; goals that may never fully be achieved, but that give us direction and purpose. Through which we have

real resilience as we view our failures and losses merely as data points observe and learn from, rather than endpoints.

This perspective changes how we view apparently ordinary moments. For example, a parent approaching a chess game with a child focused on "winning" risks a weakened family relationship. However, when parents use the playing of that finite game with their children, not to win, but to strengthen their connection, they help spur the child's development and growth.

The same mindset shift affects other finite games such as grocery shopping and military careers. When we connect these finite games to a more infinite purpose, such as service, growth, or commitment, they take on deeper meaning.

Our goal in life should not simply be to win any given moment, but to remain faithful to something that endures long after that moment has passed.

K-THEME PARKS FOR EVERY TASTE & MUST-RIDE ATTRACTIONS Pt. 1/2



Korea's theme parks offer far more than rides. There are full-day destinations with seasonal festivals, colorful shows, and nearby attractions to explore. Across the country, from Lotte World in Seoul and Everland in Yongin to Gyeongju World in Gyeongju and Shinhwa World in Jeju, there is a park for every schedule and travel style. Whether you are after heart-pounding rides or dazzling parades, find the K-theme park that fits your taste and make it part of your trip to Korea!

Before You Visit

To get the most out of your theme park visit, check these tips before you go.

- **Book tickets in advance:** Admission is usually cheaper online than at the gate. You can also save by checking deals on global online tour booking platforms or special offers on the park's official website.
- **Download the official app:** Many theme parks have their own app that lets you check live wait times, view park maps, and even book certain attractions, so it is worth installing before you go.
- **Go early:** Weekends and public holidays can get busy, so arrive early enough to enter right when the park opens.
- **Plan your route and ride the big attractions first:** Crowds and wait times usually build as the day goes on, so head to the most popular rides first thing in the morning. Operations may also change depending on the weather, so check the forecast before you visit.
- **Rent a portable charger:** Major theme parks such as Lotte World, Gyeongju World, E-World, and LEGOLAND offer portable charger rentals in case your phone battery runs low.

FAQ for Visitors

- Q.** Are the theme parks in Korea open on rainy days? Which ones are good to visit when it rains?
A. Most theme parks stay open in the rain, although some rides may close depending on the weather. Lotte World in Seoul is a good choice for rainy days, thanks to its large indoor area.
- Q.** Can I use a credit card at the theme parks in Korea?
A. Yes. Most theme parks accept major credit cards, including Visa and Mastercard, so you don't need to carry much cash. However, some lockers and arcade games may be cash-only, so it is worth keeping a small amount with you.
- Q.** Are there any services for solo theme park visitors?
A. Some theme parks let solo visitors use empty seats on rides, which can help shorten the wait. At Lotte World in Seoul, for example, select attractions have a separate Single Rider line.
- Q.** Can I bring food or a packed lunch into the theme park?
A. Most theme parks allow outside food, but you will usually need to eat it in a designated picnic area, not inside the park restaurants.
- Q.** Can I rent a school uniform near the theme parks?
A. Yes. You will find plenty of school uniform rental shops near major theme parks. Spending a day in a Korean-style school uniform is a popular experience for both Korean and international visitors.

KUNSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- As a dental logistics NCOIC, Miranda revitalized the dental cost center program, removing \$9,000 of expired assets and reorganizing \$14,000 worth of critical supplies, while implementing a tracking system that cut supply waste down by 30%.

Additionally, as the dental support NCOIC, she headed three departments, \$800,000 in equipment and \$200,000 in supply items. She also authored \$300,000 in equipment replacement packages, resulting in a 60% increase in clinic capabilities.

Miranda also coordinated front desk operations, overseeing the implementation of an electronic record tracking system for 1,700 dental treatment records. Her actions closed a four year shortfall and delivered the medical group's annual audit with a 98% compliance.

Finally, Miranda was selected as the number one out of six candidates for the Wing Honor Guard NCOIC position, which she held for three weeks. Her actions in this role supported 17 change of command ceremonies, leading 17 honor guard personnel through 26 training sessions and securing certifications for 11 members.

Popular Theme Parks in the Seoul Metropolitan Area: Lotte World and Everland

These flagship theme parks are popular with both Korean and international visitors, offering a wide mix of attractions and facilities. From rides and parades to nearby sights worth exploring, there's more than enough to fill an entire day.



Lotte World in Seoul

Lotte World is an indoor-outdoor theme park in the heart of Seoul. It is especially known for its story-driven indoor attractions and dark rides, and it can easily be reached via subway, which has an exit passage that connects directly to the park. With Songpa Naru Park (Seokchonhosu Lake), Lotte World Tower, Lotte World Indoor Ice Skating Rink, and the Lotte World Folk Museum all in the same area, it is a great choice for a full day out in Seoul.

Must-Ride Attractions at Lotte World

Atlantis Adventure (a high-speed roller coaster that races up to 72 km/h), Comet Express (a space-themed indoor coaster with plenty of twists and turns), French Revolution (an indoor roller coaster that sends you through 360-degree loops), Aeronauts Balloon Ride (a gentle suspended ride with panoramic views of the indoor park), and more.

Tips for Making the Most of Lotte World

- To spend less time in line, take advantage of Magic Pass that lets you book or get quicker access to popular rides. It can be used up to five times through the mobile app or on-site kiosks. Available rides vary by pass type, so check the details before you go.
- Parades take place daily at 14:00 and 20:00. They start near The Conquistador on the first floor, then make their way around the ice rink for about 30 minutes. For a comfortable seated view of the full route, the Garden Stage is a good spot.
- A new Maple Story-themed zone, inspired by the popular game, has opened in the outdoor area. Experience zones, photo spots, and hidden events will be available through Sunday, June 14, while the attractions will stay open year-round.

Tips for Making the Most of Everland

- Use Smart Reservation feature in the official app to book popular rides ahead of time and spend less time in line. Selected attractions run on Smart Reservation from 10:00 to 14:00, then switch to regular standby lines after that. To book the same time slot for your group, register everyone's tickets in one device.
- Parades are held daily at 14:00 and 20:20 in Carnival Square and run for about 30 minutes. A fireworks show begins afterward at 21:20. Check the official Everland app for the most up-to-date schedule.
- Getting there by subway: Get off at Jeondae Everland Station, the final stop on the EverLine, then take the free shuttle to Everland and Caribbean Bay. (The shuttle runs throughout the day.)
- The Everland One-Day Pass includes free same-day afternoon admission to Caribbean Bay through Thursday, May 28. Promotional offers vary by season, so check the latest details before you go.
