DRAGON FLIGHT marks Osan's first Group 3 UAS defense exercise

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- U.S. Airmen, U.S. Soldiers, U.S. Marines and Republic of Korea Air Force personnel came together for EXERCISE DRAGON FLIGHT, an inaugural readiness event designed to locate, detect and track a Group 3 unmanned aircraft system in Osan airspace at Osan Air Base, ROK, Aug. 2-6, 2026.

The exercise marked the first time a Group 3 UAS operated in Osan airspace, allowing participating agencies to rehearse detection, tracking, cueing, reporting and notional engagement procedures against a larger and more

capable class of unmanned aircraft.

Contractors from Griffon Aerospace launched and operated the Outlaw Drone as a simulated hostile aircraft while each participating unit employed its respective counter-UAS equipment. Defenders from the 51st Security Forces Squadron operated the Expeditionary Mobile Air Defense Integrated System, Soldiers from the Army's 35th Air Defense Artillery Brigade employed the AN/TWQ-1 Avenger air defense system, and Marines from the 2nd Low Altitude Air Defense Battalion trained with Stinger man-portable air defense systems and Smart Shooter SMASH optics. ROKAF personnel also participated using their own air defense equipment.

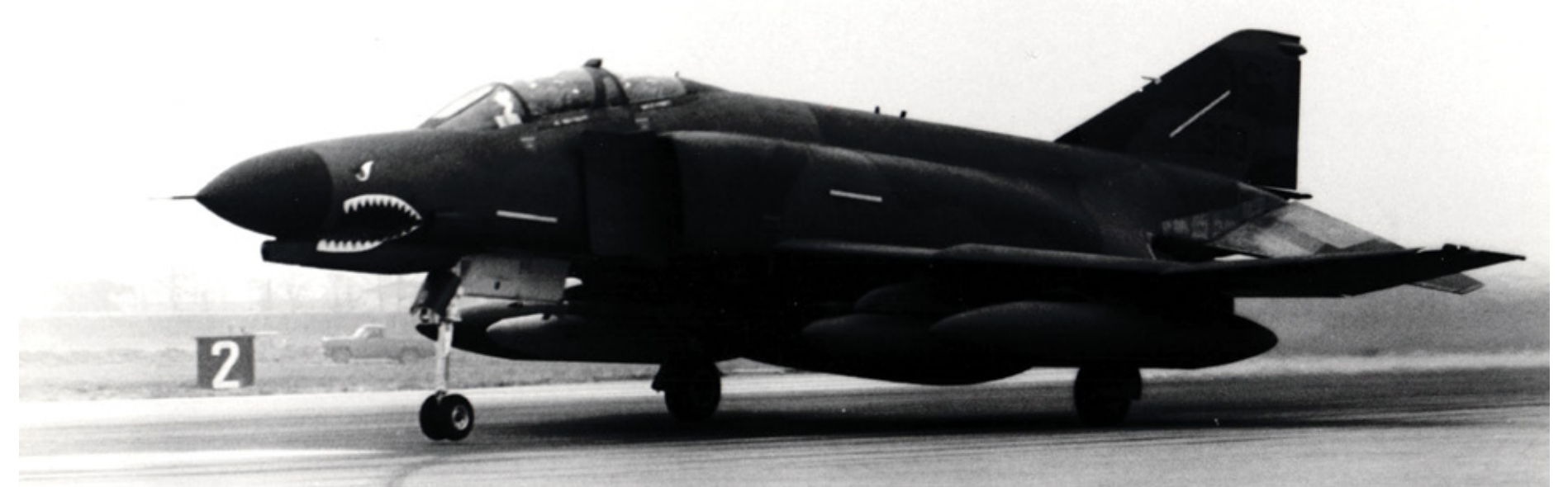
OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- August 18, 2026, marks a historic milestone for the 51st Fighter Wing—its 78th continuous year of "Leading the Charge." Activated on Aug. 18, 1948, at Naha Air Base, Okinawa, the 51st Fighter Wing was born during a period of massive transition for the newly independent U.S. Air Force. Today, nearly eight decades later, the Mustangs remain the premier forward-deployed fighter wing in the world, standing resolutely in partnership with the Republic of Korea.

The wing's legacy is forged in the crucible of the Korean War. Redesignated as the 51st Fighter-Interceptor Wing in 1950, the unit deployed to the Korean peninsula and quickly established an unmatched combat record.

Flying the F-80 Shooting Star—which claimed the world's first all-jet aerial victory on Nov. 8, 1950—and later the F-86 Sabre, the wing's pilots flew more than 45,000 sorties. They achieved a stunning 14-to-1 kill ratio against enemy MiG-15s and produced 14 Air Force Aces, including the top ace of the war, Capt. Joseph

McConnell Jr., who recorded 16 aerial victories.

Throughout the Cold War, the 51st FIW demonstrated constant mobility and readiness, deploying to Taiwan during the Strait Crisis of 1958, and to the Philippines and South Vietnam in 1964. In 1968, in response to the seizure of the USS Pueblo, the wing rapidly deployed F-102 Delta Daggers to Suwon Air Base, South Korea, demonstrating an ironclad commitment to its regional allies.

On Nov. 1, 1971, the 51st Air Base Wing established its permanent home at Osan Air Base, assuming host base responsibilities on the peninsula.

Over the ensuing 55 years, the wing's aircraft inventory has constantly evolved to meet the demands of the mission, seeing the legendary F-4 Phantom II, the rugged OV-10 Bronco, the beloved A-10 Thunderbolt II, and successive blocks of the multirole F-16 Fighting Falcon.

As the wing celebrates its 78th birthday, it honors this unbroken line of airpower excellence.

Following the recent historic divestment of the A-10 and the completion of the Air Force's F-16 Super Squadron testing phase, the Mustangs have solidified a streamlined, highly integrated, and lethal F-16 combat posture. By continuously mastering Agile Combat Employment (ACE), the 51st FW ensures it remains the most ready, cohesive team in the region, prepared to receive and integrate follow-on forces at a moment's notice.

From the prop-driven pursuits of its WWII namesake group to the advanced F-16 Fighting Falcons of today, the 51st Fighter Wing's 78-year heritage is a testament to the dedication of its Airmen. Defend the Base, Execute Contingency Operations, and Sustain the Force—Happy 78th birthday, Mustangs!

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MSgt Marcus Hollins

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- U.S. Air Force Master Sgt. Marcus Hollins, 51st Medical Support Squadron pharmacy operations section chief, was recognized as the Mustang of the Week at Osan Air Base, Republic of Korea, Aug. 7, 2026.

Since arriving at Osan in January 2025, Hollins has brought his experience, mentorship and passion for coaching into his role supporting Airmen and patients across the installation.

As the pharmacy operations section chief, Hollins helps lead a team responsible for ensuring patients receive the correct medication and dosages while navigating the unpredictable pace of pharmacy operations.

"We keep people in the fight," Hollins said. "It's our job to give them the right medication, make sure they're getting the right dose and make sure they're able to get back into the fight."

Pharmacy personnel serve as one of the final safeguards in a patient's care, reviewing prescriptions and ensuring potential errors are identified before medication reaches the patient. The work can also be stressful, with the team balancing patient needs, provider coordination and changing workloads each day.

One of Hollins' priorities is keeping his team grounded through those stressful moments while still maintaining high standards.

"Pharmacy is stressful," said Hollins. "I try to keep it as light as possible while still holding the standards and making sure I'm taking care of the Airmen so we can take care of the mission."

Maj. Gregory Correale, 51st MDSS diagnostics and therapeutics flight commander, reflected on how Hollins' experiences have helped him bring a unique approach to mentoring Airmen, especially when preparing them for challenging environments.

"With his deployment experience, he has done a fantastic job of educating our younger Airmen on the operations and stressors involved in doing pharmacy," said Correale. "He brings a unique mentoring style and perspective, relying on his personal and professional experiences."

Much of that mentoring style was shaped through Hollins' longtime passion for basketball. Hollins began coaching early on at the high school level before rising to the opportunity to coach the U.S. Air Force Women's Basketball Team.

As a young staff sergeant, one of Hollins' mentors challenged him to consider the similarities between coaching a basketball team and leading in the military.

"Basketball coaching has actually transformed my career as a leader," said Hollins. "Coaches teach

players, place them in positions to succeed, build team culture and hold people accountable, not different from a leader in the Air Force."

His willingness to help others extends beyond his immediate work center. Hollins prioritizes mentoring others whether they fall within his fight or participate in a basketball summer camp.

"There are so many stories of Master Sgt. Hollins going the extra mile to make sure those he leads, coaches or interacts with always feels important and recognized," said Lt. Col. Jacob Williams, 51st MDSS commander. "I'm glad to have the opportunity to make him feel the same way. We appreciate all he continues to do for our Mustang Medics, Team Osan and the U.S. Air Force Women's Basketball Team."

Ready beyond the mission: Airmen, Soldiers respond to roadside emergency

OSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- U.S. Airmen and U.S. Soldiers without regard for recognition or personal safety sprang into action after a tour bus overturned, assisting injured passengers until emergency services arrived.

U.S. Air Force Maj. Tessa Land, 6th Intelligence Squadron director of operations, Chief Master Sgt. Brandon Abbott, Seventh Air Force A2 senior enlisted leader, U.S. Army Staff Sgt. Alexander Martin, 35th Air Defense Artillery Brigade fire direction center battle systems manager, Spc. Karan Sharma, and Spc. Arturo Lara, 35th ADA fire direction center battle systems operators, were participating in an off-duty tour of the Korean Demilitarized Zone in Paju, Republic of Korea, June 20, 2026.

The group was on their way to lunch after a morning at the Dora Observatory when their bus paused on a hill road to allow another bus to pass. Passengers watched as the other tour bus struggled to climb the wet road. Moments later, the oncoming vehicle lost control, overturned, and slid backward before coming to rest on the steep incline.

"I watched the bus come up, stop at the top, and then begin barreling down the hill and turn over onto its left side," said Lara. "At that moment, I just shot up and rushed to the door of our bus. I wasn't really thinking, it was just a natural reaction. All I knew was that we needed to get people out of the bus."

Knowing people could be hurt and unsure of the potential the bus would slide further downhill, the group of Airmen and Soldiers immediately jumped into action.

As they approached the vehicle, they could hear the passengers screaming. The primary exit door was inaccessible, trapping 21 civilian passengers inside.

Forced to find an alternative means to enter the vehicle, they discovered part of the windshield was cracked. After bending the still active windshield wipers out of the way and carefully straddling a drainage ditch, they widened the opening enough to climb inside, ignoring cuts they received from the broken glass.

Through a mix of radio blaring and panicked voices within, the group of service members began their assessment of injuries and extracting individuals from the vehicle.

Working their way from the front of the bus toward the back, they assisted the bus driver before helping shocked and disoriented passengers through the windshield. At one point, a father asked responders to help rescue his blind daughter, who was carried out to a rally point that was set up nearby.

"I remember thinking to myself I'm glad I've had some baseline training to help understand what to do, because we didn't know what we were going to see when we got in there," said Abbott.

Another passenger lay on the ground surrounded among the shattered glass. She expressed that she was having trouble breathing and that she could not move her neck. Recognizing the potential severity of her injuries, Abbott alerted a civilian paramedic and Canadian infantryman with medical training, both tourists who joined the response, to provide advanced first aid.

While the removal of passengers was ongoing, a cordon was established to keep onlookers from getting too close and keep individuals from trying to reenter the bus to retrieve belongings. ROK soldiers also arrived on scene, called emergency services, and assisted with the response.

Eventually, emergency services arrived and assumed control of the scene. The U.S. service members stepped back, allowing first responders to continue caring for the injured.

Martin, who experienced similar situations in his time with law enforcement prior to joining the Army, expressed pride in those who stepped in to help others.

"You can train, but you don't know what you are going to do until the actual incident happens," said Martin. "They stepped up and I am proud of what they did."

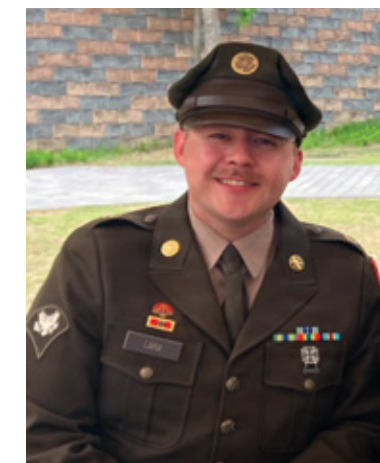
Although the responders came from different units, services and even countries, the response reflected a shared commitment to helping others. Airmen, Soldiers, ROK personnel and civilian bystanders worked side by side to stabilize the situation until emergency crews arrived, demonstrating that compassion, preparedness and teamwork can transcend uniforms and nationalities.

For those involved, the rescue was never about recognition. It was about doing what needed to be done in a moment of uncertainty. Their actions demonstrated that the values instilled through training, service before self, readiness and commitment to others, do not end when the duty day is over. Instead, they remain with service members wherever they go, ready to make a difference when it matters most.

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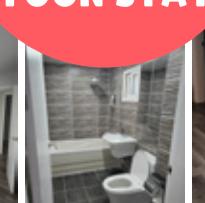
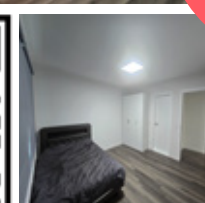


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Fire Reporting Procedure

In the event of a fire, prompt and accurate reporting is crucial for ensuring a swift response, minimizing damage, and safeguarding lives. Understanding the fire reporting procedure can make a significant difference in the outcome of an emergency.

1. Ensure Personal Safety

Before reporting a fire, prioritize your safety and the safety of others around you. If the fire is small and manageable, and you are trained, use a fire extinguisher. However, if the fire is out of control, evacuate the area immediately. Follow your building's evacuation plan, using designated exits and avoiding elevators.
2. Call Fire Department

Once you are in a safe location, call Fire Department by 911 (DSN) or 0505-784-9111. When speaking to the Fire Dispatch:
 - State that you are reporting a fire.
 - Provide the exact location of the fire, including the building number and floor number.
 - Describe the nature and extent of the fire.
 - Inform the Fire Dispatch if there are any people trapped or injured.
 - Stay on the line until the Fire Dispatch has all the necessary information.
3. Activate the Fire Alarm

If the fire alarm has not already been activated, do so immediately. Activating the alarm will alert other occupants of the building, initiating their evacuation and alerting the Fire Department.
4. Evacuate Safely

Follow the building's evacuation plan, moving quickly but calmly to the nearest exit. Once outside, move away from the building to a designated rally point and do not re-enter until authorities have declared it safe.
5. Provide information to Responders

When the Fire Department arrives, provide them with any additional information they may need:
 - The exact location of the fire within the building.
 - Any hazardous materials that might be involved.
 - Locations where people might be trapped.
 - Any other details that could help them effectively fight the fire.
6. Wait for the All-Clear

Do not re-enter the building until fire authorities have given the all-clear. Even if the fire appears to be extinguished, hidden dangers such as smoke, structural damage, or lingering flames may still pose a risk.

Being prepared and knowing the fire reporting procedure can save lives and reduce property damage. Familiarize yourself with these steps to ensure you are ready to act in the event of a fire.

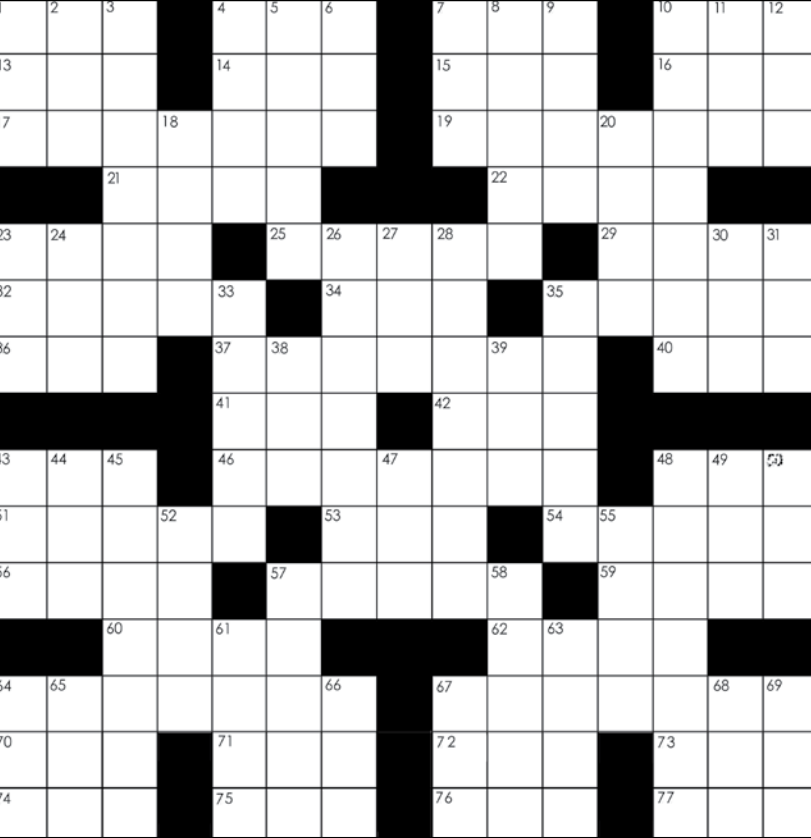

“This exercise helped all the involved agencies assess and validate their respective C-uAS defense systems,” said U.S. Air Force 1st Lt. Thu Le, 51st SFS plans and programs officer in charge. “I hope that this event gives the 51st Fighter Wing confidence in its current air defense capabilities and just shows how crucial such systems are to the defense of the base, its assets and all 16,000 joint-force personnel.”

Le served as the lead 51st SFS point of contact and maintained ground command and control during the exercise. She coordinated with the 51st Operations Support Squadron to secure the equipment, airspace and flight authorizations needed for contracted operators to fly the UAS over Osan.

U.S. Army Sgt. 1st Class Jonathan Herndon, Echo Battery, 6th Battalion, 52nd Air Defense Artillery Regiment, 35th ADA Brigade, 3rd Platoon sergeant, served as the Army air defense non-commissioned officer in charge and primary liaison for the drone operators. He also worked with the 51st SFS during planning to establish the training location and objectives.

Beyond familiarizing younger Soldiers with Group 3 UAS identification and tracking procedures, EXERCISE DRAGON FLIGHT allowed the participating services to assess how their different systems and reporting processes could contribute to a layered defense of the installation.

Osan’s ability to defend against unmanned aircraft directly supports the 51st Fighter Wing’s sortie-generation mission. Protecting personnel, aircraft and other critical assets enables the wing to continue generating combat airpower while operating in a contested environment.

“Osan Air Base is an important location to hold in order to generate sorties for deterrence,” said U.S. Marine Corps 1st Lt. Chi Vu, 2nd LAAD Battalion platoon commander. “This exercise brought different branches together to establish information-exchange requirements so Osan can be protected using a mix of air defense assets.”

Vu supervised his platoon’s integration and helped establish procedures for sharing information among the participating services. While the systems brought different capabilities to the exercise, the training helped personnel better understand how those capabilities could complement one another during a coordinated response.

“It increased the lethality of the participating units as a whole because we now better understand each other’s functions and how we can integrate as a team,” Vu said.

The inclusion of ROKAF counterparts expanded Dragon Flight from a joint U.S. training event into a combined effort reflecting the forces that would defend Osan together during contingency operations.

“This exercise embodies United States Forces Korea’s motto, ‘Katchi Kapshida,’ or ‘We go together,’” Le said. “If UAS attacks become a reality at Osan, the U.S. military and our ROKAF counterparts will be expected to defend the base, execute contingency operations and sustain the force alongside each other.”

By bringing multiple services, air defense systems and ROKAF counterparts into the same training environment, Exercise Dragon Flight established a foundation for future counter-UAS exercises and strengthened Osan’s ability to protect the personnel and assets responsible for generating combat airpower.

He performed 188-point inspections on a \$64M fuels system, while operating the system to deliver 44,518 gallons of JP-8 jet fuel to 13 allied Republic of Korea Air Force assets, showcasing flight cohesion and the combined-interoperability between the U.S. and ROK armed forces.

The Strongest Armor Within: Conscience

The word conscience, as its Chinese characters suggest, literally means a "good and benevolent mind." In dictionary terms, it refers to the moral awareness that judges right from wrong, commands goodness, and rejects evil. We often rely on physical strength or social status to shield ourselves from external threats. However, the wisdom of the ages teaches us that true self-protection

begins from within. The Bie-yi Za-han Jing (Extra Agama Sutra) teaches, "Even if cavalry and chariots surround me in layers to protect me, if the intention within is not good, it cannot be called protecting oneself". No matter how strong a fortress we build, it is useless if our internal line of defense collapses. Within the unique social structure of a military organization, conscience manifests itself in more concrete and practical ways. Just as honest cooking is the expression of a chef's conscience, and factual reporting is the expression of a journalist's conscience, a soldier's conscience is directly linked to fulfilling military duty. From senior commanders to junior officers, and from senior noncommissioned officers to enlisted personnel, fulfilling one's responsibilities in each assigned position forms the foundation of a healthy military conscience. Conscience is cultivated through education and experience and, especially for those of us in uniform, must be deeply engraved in our hearts as a social conscience that demands behavior and attitudes befitting our rank. In today's complex and fiercely

competitive society, living faithfully according to one's conscience is far from easy. We often ignore the voice of conscience for personal gain or momentary comfort, rationalizing our actions with various excuses. At times, we willingly wear a mask for our own pleasure and benefit, even if others suffer or experience pain as a result. Yet, while we may deceive everyone else in the world, there is one person we can never fool: ourselves. The internal conflict and silent anguish that follow the betrayal of conscience often prove more painful than any criticism or judgment from others. As we grow older and become more experienced in navigating the realities of life, we should pause to ask ourselves whether we are drifting away from the conscience that once guided us. Greater authority and broader experience ought to deepen our moral character. Yet, we too often witness wisdom being replaced by clever self-interest. Many of the social problems we see today ultimately stem from a conscience that has ceased to stand watch over the human heart. The strongest shield that protects us is neither a heavily

funded bodyguard nor the applause of those who stand behind us. A conscience forged harder than diamond is the most reliable defense. By carefully examining our hearts and straightening the standards of our conscience, we no longer need to hide behind masks. Instead, we are free to live authentically as our true selves. As we reflect on this year, each of us should ask: What kind of heart has filled our days and guided our daily lives? When our conscience whispered to us, did we willingly listen to its voice? Or did we repeatedly compromise for the sake of personal advantage? For those of us wearing the military uniform, conscience transcends a private moral virtue. It is the final safeguard that protects our comrades, preserves the trust upon which military service depends, and ultimately strengthens mission readiness. It is my sincere hope that the good hearts of all of us will come together to brighten our military community and that each of us will carry the strongest shield within our hearts.

Wolf Pack executes Beverly Sentinel 26-4

KUNSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea -- Running from July 21-23, exercise Beverly Sentinel 26-4 demonstrated the 8th Fighter Wing's commitment to readiness and force preparedness. Through intense exercise scenarios, Wolf Pack Airmen sharpened their specialized skills and practiced critical decision making under pressure, maintaining an operational tempo required to sustain combat operations in a contested environment.

During Bev. Sent. 26-4, Wolf Pack Airmen focused on Ability to Survive and Operate training scenarios, an essential component toward exercising the 8th Fighter Wing's ability to defend Kunsan Air Base and sustain mission critical operations.

"Ensuring operational continuity in a contested environment is not optional," said U.S. Air Force Col. John "Wolf" DeLion, 8th Fighter Wing commander. "By implementing these realistic training scenarios, we enhance the resilience and readiness required of our members to project combat airpower and execute the Wolf Pack mission under any conditions."

Each Wolf Pack unit bolstered mission-essential skills while refining life-saving techniques and strategies, including Tactical Combat Casualty Care, opposition force response, post-attack reconnaissance and emergency response procedures.

U.S. Air Force Senior Airman Dylan Hayes, an 8th Security Forces Squadron base defense operations center operator, was one of many Airmen during the exercise who understands the value of ATSO training for the Wolf Pack.

"Continuous, high-tempo training builds strong muscle memory that you can fall back on when stress and pressure begin to set in," said Hayes. "This exercise prepares individual Airmen at Kunsan for real-world combat by forcing them to survive, operate and defend the installation under simulated, high-intensity enemy attacks."

Hayes was one of four 8th SFS members assigned to patrol the

installation inside a Humvee, providing surveillance and force response measures ranging from simulated attacks at ground level with opposing forces and from above with unmanned aircraft systems.

Additionally, the exercise demonstrated joint force operations by showcasing sister services working side by side to defend the base, integrating their capabilities into a unified, layered defense against potential threats.

"My unit and the [8th Civil Engineer Squadron emergency management flight] work on airfields and both can be attacked by the enemy simultaneously," said U.S. Marine Corps Sgt. Jesus Duran, a Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear defense specialist attached to the Marine Wing Support Squadron 171, Iwakuni, Japan. "Practicing how to respond to said attacks together definitely teaches us how each other operates and responds to these emergencies."

Duran participated in Bev. Sent. 26-4 as the U.S. Marine Corps CBRN Cell counterpart for Kunsan's Emergency Operations Center, reporting potential hazards in response to simulated threats, providing recommended courses of action to base leaders, and relaying that information to ground CBRN teams to execute.

"How the Airmen have dedicated CBRN teams and equipment bags at the ready - it taught me how to be more efficient, and I want to bring this system back to my Marines," said Duran. "Bringing more branches together to train can only strengthen our capability as a military whole."

Integrating with sister services during exercises such as Bev. Sent. 26-4 validates ATSO training as not an individual task, but a joint imperative required to sustain combat operations under pressure.

As Bev. Sent. 26-4 concludes, that readiness under pressure remains a key theme for the Wolf Pack, weaving its way through the everyday lives of Kunsan Air Base's servicemembers while bolstering the 8th Fighter Wing's "Fight Tonight" posture.

"We execute these exercises routinely to stress-test our Airmen and systems, identifying the friction points, and adapting our tactics with the lessons we learned," said DeLion. "We stress-test our processes in peacetime, to be ready when called upon."

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Jeju International Airport

Jeju International Airport (CJU) is the most convenient gateway for travelers heading to one of Korea's most popular vacation destinations without connecting through Seoul. The airport handled a record 3.02 million international passengers in 2025, providing easy access to attractions across the island. This guide highlights some of Jeju's must-visit destinations along with nearby islands accessible by ferry.

Jeju International Airport is one of Korea's busiest airports, handling more flights than any airport in the country except Incheon International Airport. As of July 2026, nonstop international services connect Jeju with 23 cities across six regions including China, Japan, Taiwan, Hong Kong, and Singapore. Domestic routes also link the island with major Korean cities such as Seoul, Incheon, and Busan. Popular attractions including Hyeopjae Beach, Jungmun Tourist Complex, and Seongsan Ilchulbong Tuff Cone are just approximately 1 to 1.5 hours away from the airport by public transportation.

Marine Tourism: What Makes Jeju's Sea Special

Jeju's beaches stand out even in Korea, a country surrounded by the sea on three sides. Black basalt formed by volcanic activity creates a striking contrast with the island's emerald waters. From crystal-clear seas to rocky gorges framed by dramatic cliffs, discover coastal scenery found only in Jeju.

► Recommended Attractions

- **Hamdeok Beach**
Hamdeok Beach is one of the most popular beaches on the eastern part of Jeju along with Hyeopjae and Gimnyeong Beaches and is known for its beautiful turquoise waters. A short climb up Seoubong Volcanic Cone, visitors are rewarded with panoramic views of the sea and Hallasan Mountain by an oreum (volcanic cone) beside the beach.
- **Hyeopjae Beach**
With emerald waters and soft white sand, Hyeopjae Beach is one of the best-known beaches on the western part of Jeju. Its shallow waters make it a favorite among families with children, and the sight of the sun setting behind Biyangdo Island is especially breathtaking.
- **Soesokkak Estuary**
This scenic gorge was formed where freshwater flowing down from Hallasan Mountain meets the sea, creating deep pools. Visitors can enjoy the scenery aboard a tewoo—a traditional Jeju raft—or in a small rowboat for two or three people.



Geotourism: Natural Wonders of Volcanic Jeju

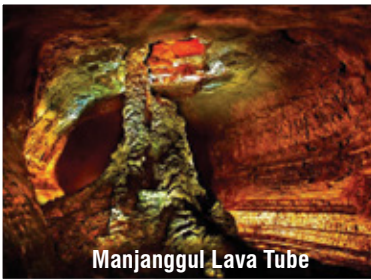
Jeju is a volcanic island formed by a series of eruptions that began around 1.8 million years ago. Hallasan Mountain, Seongsan Ilchulbong Tuff Cone, and Geomunoreum Lava Tube System were collectively designated as Korea's first UNESCO World Natural Heritage site, with the entire island also recognized as a UNESCO Global Geopark and Biosphere Reserve. From craters rising above the sea to underground lava tubes created as molten lava that cooled and hardened, Jeju offers a glimpse into the island's ancient natural history.

► Recommended Attractions

- **Seongsan Ilchulbong Tuff Cone**
Seongsan Ilchulbong Tuff Cone was formed by an underwater volcanic eruption in shallow seas around 5,000 years ago and is now one of Jeju's most popular sunrise spots. The summit, which can be reached after walking for about 30 minutes, features a crater approximately 600 meters across.
- **Hallasan Mountain**
At 1,947 meters high, Hallasan Mountain is the tallest mountain in Korea. Among its seven hiking trails, only the Seongpanak and Gwaneumsa routes lead all the way to Baengnokdam Lake at the summit. Walk through the woods along Hallasan Eco-trail—a trail which runs at elevations of 600 to 800 meters—for a more leisurely alternative.
- **Manjanggul Lava Tube**
Formed thousands of years ago, this lava tube remains a cool 12°C year-round even at the height of summer. Visitors can explore about 1 kilometer of its total 7.4-kilometer length, including a 7.6-meter-high lava column considered the largest of its kind in the world.

Nearby Islands Worth Visiting: Udo, Marado, and Biyangdo Islands

- 1. Udo Island:**
Udo Island is the largest and most popular among Jeju's more than 60 surrounding islands. Visitors can get around by shuttle bus or rent an electric bike or a scooter to explore at their own pace. The 17-kilometer loop around the island takes about 2-3 hours by electric bike. The ferry ride from Seongsan Port on Jeju's east coast takes about 15 minutes.
- 2. Marado Island**
Marado Island is the southernmost island in South Korea. Its mostly flat landscape offers uninterrupted views of the land stretching out beneath a vast open sky. Only 500 meters wide and 1.3 kilometers long, the island can be explored at a leisurely pace in about an hour. Ferries from Unjin Port and Songaksan Port (Sanisudong Port) take approximately 30 minutes.
- 3. Biyangdo Island**
Biyangdo Island located just off Hyeopjae Beach may be small, but is dotted with remarkable traces of volcanic activity including hornitos or lava chimneys as well as a massive volcanic bomb weighing around 10 tons. Visitors can walk the coastal trail around the island or climb Biyangbong Peak for sweeping views. The ferry ride from Hallim Port on Jeju's west coast takes about 15 minutes.

Culinary Travel: Local Flavors from Jeju's Land and Sea

Jeju has one of Korea's most distinctive food cultures, shaped by the island's unique natural environment. Its local specialties include: seafood harvested by haenyeo, whose traditional diving culture is designated as National Intangible Cultural Heritage; pasture-raised Jeju black pork; and mandarins and hallabong grown on the island's warm climate. Savor the distinctive flavors of Jeju, from the bounty of its land and sea.

► Recommended Attractions

- **Haenyeo's Kitchen**
At Haenyeo's Kitchen, visitors can learn about Jeju haenyeo, which is inscribed on the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity List, while enjoying seafood gathered by the divers themselves. The Jongdal Branch pairs a live performance with a buffet, with the Bukchon Branch offering a multi-course seafood meal accompanied by immersive media art. Nearby, the Jeju Haenyeo Museum provides an in-depth look at the lives and traditions of Jeju's haenyeo.
- **Dongmun Traditional Market**
Jeju Dongmun Traditional Market is the island's largest traditional market with history spanning more than 80 years. Every evening, the area around Gate 8 comes alive with a night market offering trendy street foods such as black pork kimchi rolls and abalone gimhap.
- **Seogwipo Maelle Market**
Located in Central Seogwipo, this lively year-round market also turns into a night market in the evening. A covered arcade spans the entire market, making it easy to explore even on rainy days. Visitors can enjoy everything from Jeju specialties such as omegitteok (millet rice cake) and hallabong juice to a wide variety of fresh seafood.
